As I enter my 27th year with the Among Friends Meal Program (AFMP), I've been asked



what keeps me so invested in the work that the Among Friends Meal Program does for our local communities. The number one reason is the relationships I've been afforded to make with our guests and our dedicated volunteers. I'm more concerned than ever about those in our community who rely on our meals. Our number of guests is higher than ever (about a 10% increase from 2023 to 2024 and projected even higher for 2025). Guest's needs are ever-increasing and we are trying to meet these needs by providing some other vital services to our guests while they are within our walls of St. Paul's Church. Our

free haircut days, free laundry facilities, and clothing and undergarments closet are all items brought to life from our work on our strategic plan which we compiled last year. Meal programs, food pantries, food banks, local food purchase organizations, and the broader food assistance community are encountering stark new realities in their ongoing missions to provide free, healthy food to those who are in critical need. Troubling recent headlines chronicle substantial immediate and planned federal cuts nationwide by the Trump administration of funding for the distribution of nutritious food to food banks and funding to buy locally produced commodities from farmers. For example, more than \$12 million in federal funding, known as Northeast Food for Schools (NFS) in Massachusetts, has also been cancelled immediately to provide local healthy food to childcare programs and schools, and expanded procurement relationships with local producers and small businesses. Governor Maura Healy has been critical "declaring that feeding children and supporting local farmers are no longer 'priorities' and it's just the latest terrible cut with real impact on families across Massachusetts."

The Greater Boston Food Bank, <u>GBFB.org</u>, learned last week of cancellations of \$3.3 million in food orders (about 122,000 cases of food assistance), including \$2.3 million for GBFB

equating to approximately 105,000 cases of protein, dairy, and produce scheduled to come to its facilities. "The Greater Boston Food Bank is already facing increased demand for nutritious food across our network of 600 food pantries across Eastern Massachusetts," President and CEO Catherine D'Amato said. "TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program) is a vital program that provides the Mass Coalition of Food Banks with a reliable source of fresh agricultural products including produce, proteins and dairy, the most requested items by the people we serve." The recent food item cancellations represent about 3% of the GBFB's total food distribution across Eastern Massachusetts. The items include pears, apples, dried cranberries and raisins, canned vegetables and beans, rice: chicken, pork, fish; and dried noodles to name a few. "The cancellations of federal commodities will reduce food throughout our region, making it more difficult for food insecure people to feed themselves and their families," D' Amato said. "GBFB will need to raise money to replace and purchase this healthy food that our neighbors so desperately need."

Bonnie Schultz, Director of the Among Friends Meal Program's (AFMP),



www.AmongFriendsMealProgram.com, orders approximately 2700 pounds of food per month from the GBFB. Typically, the selection varies and comprises nutritious fresh, dried, canned, and frozen foods across all food groups. The monthly menu, consisting of three meals per week, is developed with volunteer lead cooks according to the foods available and procured. Storage is at St. Paul's Church, Newburyport and at the Seacoast Food Hub in Salisbury. Around eighty-five percent of AFMP's food is provided by the GBFB with additional fresh produce delivered by Nourishing the North Shore, donated items from church parishioners, individual donations

(eggs), bread and rolls from Fantini Bakery in Haverhill and items purchased by AFMP at local grocery stores and wholesalers. AFMP continues to operate solely with over seventy volunteers who in 2024 prepared, delivered, and served over 18,000 fresh nutritious, home-cooked meals. Currently, AFMP provides dinner Monday 5-6 pm, and lunches Tuesday and Friday 11:00-12:30. The program offers sit down dining, free delivery, and take-out meals, including (20) to Link House, a nearby addiction treatment residence. The number of no-cost meals prepared by volunteers during the first months of this year has increased from approximately 120 to 140 or more meals each day, or a 15 percent increase. The program fosters a safe, welcoming, environment for guests where social connections become enhanced, health is improved, and opportunities for additional services, such as no-cost laundry and haircuts are available.



AFMP works collaboratively with other food assistance agencies and organizations and is a member of the Lower Merrimack Valley Food Coalition (LMVFC). Working together to ameliorate food insecurity is more important than ever in an environment of funding uncertainties, reductions in available USDA food contributions, and potential losses of local produce from local farmers, and small businesses that grow all year round in

greenhouses.

Nourishing the North Shore (NNS), <u>www.NourishingtheNorthShore.org</u>, is an invaluable partner, distributing fresh, nutritious, locally grown produce it purchases from 30 plus Essex County Farms and small businesses all year round. In 2024 alone, NNS distributed over approximately 11,000 pounds to Newburyport sites, including approximately 3000 pounds to AFMP, over 11,000 servings and more than \$11,000 in total value. NNS received



\$182,000 in USDA Local Food Purchase Assistance (LFPA) funding in 2024 to assist in their local farm purchases and for distributions. Recently, they learned their grant would not be renewed in 2025. NNS is exploring every possible avenue to help close the gap left by loss of funding which makes up 25% of their budget. Like other programs committed to alleviating food insecurity existing in our region, NNS insists it will maintain operations, pay their farmers and small businesses fairly for the high-quality food produced and ensure that their partners, such as AFMP, have access to fresh ingredients for preparing meals. Our Neighbor's Table (ONT) http://www.ourneighborstable.org/ located in Amesbury and in Salisbury, home of the Seacoast Regional Food Hub, continues to be a valuable resource for the community-based agencies in the seventeen towns and cities comprising the Lower Merrimack Valley Food Coalition (LMVFC). ONT is an important liaison with state and federal programs and has been a leader in setting regional priorities for food security and in data-gathering to assess progress and assess needs. Along with the Salisbury-based regional food hub, ONT operates two no-cost food markets and serves hundreds of meals. The well-known non-profit is committed to improving collaboration and cooperation between agencies and communities. ONT encourages cooperation and information exchange to maximize impact of existing funding and expand public and private support. Lyndsey Haight, ONT Executive Director, states "the federal government's role in food safety net insecurity is shrinking and the consequence of not funding the safety net adequately is people going hungry, getting sick, not going to school, and desperation as families try to keep it together and their kids fed."

A huge thank you to the many St. Paul's parishioners who donate valuable ingredients during monthly collections of a needed, usually expensive ingredient, such as olive oil or butter.

The AFMP utilizes a variety of packaging for their meals. Packaging is necessary for bagged delivery meals, take-out meals, meals provided to Community Service downstairs at St. Paul's and for family style meals to go. In recent months, many stakeholders in the program



including the advisory board have encouraged the transition to more environmentally responsible and sustainable packaging. Thankfully this effort has taken a major step forward with an earmarked monetary contribution by ICL, an employee - owned family of eight automobile dealerships, located in northern Mass. and southern N.H. Marshall Jespersen, a long serving AFMP volunteer lead cook, and who is a principal in ICL, was integral in facilitating a donation substantial enough to cover at least one year of purchasing environmentally friendly packaging materials. Thank you to Marshall and all the employees at ICL.

An additional thank you to Shaheen Bros, food products supplier, located in Amesbury, for assisting the AFMP in this endeavor.

For years composting has taken place during meal preparation and cleanup and this year AFMP utilizes Black Earth to pick up the compost bucket weekly. Thank you to Jack Weston for his generous contribution to cover a year's compost pick up.

A RECIPE TO ENIOY FROM A VOLUNTEER - Paul Bushey (Our guests do!)

Quiche (Paul has to rescale the recipe for 140 servings)



375 degrees 35 minutes 3 large eggs

½ to 1 cup of heavy or light cream or half and half (more liquid gives a lighter texture)

Pepper and nutmeg

Sprinkle bottom of pie shell with coarsely grated Swiss or cheddar cheese, 2-4 oz or ½-1 cup

Add vegetables or ham pieces over cheese E.g. broccoli, onions, leeks, asparagus

Sprinkle with butter bits

Bake until golden brown and toothpick comes out clean








